Golden Gate Fields Wine Tasting

An All Branches Event for 28 Years

Wine tasting fundraising events are not an entirely novel concept in the Branches. Our more-than-century-old group may have never produced an event on the 61st floor of a building before, but we certainly have hosted amazing wine tasting events in the past.

Starting in 1956, the Branches began a long-lasting tradition for an All Branch wine tasting event in the Golden Gate Fields Turf Club in Berkeley. Assisted by members from many Branches, Bertie Bertillion chaired this event for many years. The wine tasting event was very well attended drawing around 2,000 guests to taste Napa Valley wines from eight to ten wineries. To understand the magnitude of the Branches' reach, in 1959, there were 78 different Branches with a membership of 3,500. At that time, there were about 200 different events and projects organized by the Branches. What a task for the Branches leadership to manage, with Minnie Oliver at the helm!

Bertie Bertillion oversaw several sub-committees tasked with planning and carrying out the event. According to the Bambino Newsletter Winter edition from 1972, sub-committee chairs hailed from Laurel Jr., Acorn, Azalea, Bamboo, Birch, Fir, Live Oak and Teak, but of course the assignments varied from year to year. The key areas they chaired were tickets, clean-up, refreshments, arrangements, glasses, hostesses, decorations and check stand.

In 1966, an astonishing 145 pounds of cheese and 110 loaves of bread were served, and, according to Robin Orr (Society Editor of the Oakland Tribune at the time), the donated nibbles disappeared at alarming speed that year. In fact, they ran out! The guest count that year was 2,059. Ms. Orr referred to this event as "easily the biggest wine tasting party in Northern California" in 1966.

"Tastings were set up by varietals: dry white wines first, poured by all participating vintners," remembers Branches Ex-President and Acacia Emerita Betty Jo Olson. "It was one of the most popular events of that time and dozens of branches were involved in putting it on. It really was great fun."

"Our Branch was usually in charge of the kitchen," says Dee Farkas of Fir (now an Emeritus Branch). Fir Branch members still like to get together for lunch once a month. "One special member of Fir Branch is Jackie Bertillion," says Dee. Jackie's husband is Allen Wright Bertillion, son of Bertie and great nephew of one of Bertha Wright, one of the two founding members of "The Baby Hospital". One of the Bertillions' four children, Allen grew up aiding their mother with her Branches efforts. He fondly remembers helping his mother and the Branches volunteers prepare for the huge event. Current President Lucy (Farkas) Talbot helped as well. "I was just a little girl but I remember preparing huge trays of cheese and bread to place on the tables for the ladies and gents," reminisces Lucy.

Prior to the 24th annual wine tasting event in 1980, Betty Brendell of Hilltop Branch said: "This year, wine buffs may take their glasses home as a souvenir." The ticket price that year was \$5 and the event brought in \$6,000 for the hospital ("Bambino" 1980 fall edition). The idea of a tasting glass to take home as a party favor was picked up again by Branches President Lucy Talbot for the 2019 Sips the the City event at Salesforce. Gorgeous custom etched wine glasses were donated by Frank Maxwell of Fortessa.

Inspired by the women from a bygone era, the great wine tasting event was recreated 61 floors above San Francisco at the top of Salesforce Tower. This was on a different level indeed, and about 63 years after Bertie Bertillion's initial event at the Golden Gate Fields Turf Club. It is with great joy and pride that the Branches continue this wonderful tradition to benefit the hospital! Thanks to many tireless volunteers and supporters out there in our community. The children will surely benefit from the fruit of our labor well into the future! Cheers!



ABOUT BERTIE BERTILLION

"Bert" or "Bertie" Bertillion was a very active woman, deeply involved in several organizations in the East Bay. She joined Cedar Branch in 1933, served as chairman for Cedar Branch three times, was a member of the Branch Executive Council, was chosen "Woman of the Year" for (at least) 16 consecutive years and was chairman of the All-Branch Wine Tasting for 27 years.

As if that was not enough, Bertie was also chairman of the Camellia Ball for the East Bay Opera League, Chairman of the men's department for Oakland Museum's White Elephant Sale, a member of the Grand Jury in Sierra County, President of the East Bay Opera League, founder and life-member of Berkeley Women's City Club, and unbelievably, the list goes on! Bertie Bertillion was an impressive woman, to say the least!
