specializes in caring for children with epilepsy and other neurological conditions, spoke to the attendees about the wonderful work that she and her colleagues do to help their young patients. Her message definitely resonated as generous attendees raised \$50,000 to fund this important equipment.

And, to end the event, Lucy Talbot presented the Alice Bullard Lifetime Achievement Award to her mother **Dee Farkas** from Fir Branch.












